Big Changes on our Church Staff Team!

I usually use this space for a letter to the congregation that informs and inspires about the core spiritual themes in a season of the church or an upcoming sermon series. This month, though, I wish to reflect on a more practical part of our life together: the church staff.

2018 was my first full calendar year at CPC and I am aware that means everyone in the church experienced a lot of change, especially in worship with a different preacher than we were used to and in areas of leadership such as Session and certain committees where I am sure my approach is different than my predecessors.

However, much of the church staff has also changed over in my first year and a half here, and that represents further change for the church. Working at any church is so much more than a job as our life together is built around relationships and sharing our faith and lives of prayer and service. As head of staff, I know thorough and regular communication is key to the church understanding the changes we are in the middle of on the staff team. So here we go:

This month, we celebrate and honor **Nancy Patterson's** service to the church as she moves into retirement. We will thank her in worship at both services on Sunday, February 17 at which point she will finish in her role at the church. Nancy is a member of this church so we know this thank you is not a goodbye, but our relationship with her changes as she returns to being "just a member." Nancy receives my gratitude for her nine years of service, and especially for being such a wonderful welcome and partner in my first 16 months as your pastor.

Ryan O'Sullivan is currently being passed the baton from Nancy as he is now Full Time in his role as Operations Manager. The personnel team reworked the job description and job title to better reflect the changes in office and facility administration since Nancy came on board. I am confident Ryan will excel at all that he is tasked with. Please welcome Ryan into our church family and be gracious and patient as he gets to know the particular relationships and rhythms of our organizational life as a church.

I want to highlight some of the other transitions we have had this past year:

Emily Nelson is now more than half way through her first school year as Director of Youth and Children's Ministry. So much of her first year is just about getting to know our kids and families. She has also been a great asset to this church in occasional preaching and worship leadership. I see her growing in her gifts for ministry every month she is with us. This year she looks ahead to implement new ideas she brings to this role.

Ramiro Terrazas Herrera also came on board at the church this summer as Facility Coordinator. Ramiro primarily works nights and weekends keeping our building and grounds clean and functioning smoothly. When you see him, please get to know him and thank him for his hard work!

Yvonne Susac joined us in a new role as Contemporary Worship Leader in September. She has done well at the tough role of stepping into the worshipping life of a new church. She is great at working with the gifts of our volunteers to make beautiful music!

2018 Tax Changes What you need to know

The 2018 tax changes forum is presented by The Tax Mechanics, a certified tax preparation service based in Redmond. Owners Jeanne Kosanovic and Pat McGuinness will provide a summary explanation to the 2018 Tax Code changes for individual, non-corporate filers. Jeanne is an Oregon Licensed Tax consultant and both are federally licensed IRS Enrolled Agents as well as seasonal employee for Intuit (Turbo Tax)

Tax change topics will include: Standard deduction, Personal Exemptions, Itemized Deductions, Alternative Minimum Tax, Retirement Plan Limitations, Gains made on home sales, mortgage and home equity loan interest and more.







Quilters Quips




The quilters have been hard at work finishing twenty new quilts since the first of the year. And there are more quilts in various stages of completion. It is truly an inspiring group of people to work with.
