#### On Resurrection and Pentecost

Pentecost Sunday will be May 23. The church celebrates Pentecost seven weeks after Easter but that is not an accident of the calendar. We, as Christians, can tend to overlook the Old Testament roots of the holiday that we now claim as the birth of the church in the sending of the Spirit. Originally, Pentecost is the ancient Jewish festival of receiving the law at Mount Sinai, fifty days after the first Passover and the Exodus from Egypt. It was this Jewish festival that brought together the people of God from all over the known world to hear the good news of Jesus proclaimed, each in their own language, on Pentecost as it is described in Acts 2.

As the 21<sup>st</sup> century church, how do we understand the correlation between the resurrection of Jesus on Easter to the birth of the church in Acts 2 as it parallels the correlation between Passover/Exodus and the giving of the law at Sinai? First, we need to understand that for the ancient Israelite people of God, the giving of the law at Sinai was more than just receiving a set of instructions for living. The giving of Torah in Exodus 19 is considered a constitutive event that would define Israel, shaping and forming them into who God is calling them to be as God's set apart and holy people. They had to be set free from bondage in Egypt to then be available for God's next step of making them into God's chosen people during the wilderness years through the instructions for living in Torah given at Sinai.

This is paralleled in the connection between these holidays fifty days apart in the New Testament scriptures. We as the people of God are set free from bondage to sin and death through the cross and resurrection of Jesus. Fifty days later, in the sending of the Spirit on the apostles, and in the first public proclamation of the good news of Jesus following the resurrection, the church is formed and shaped into being God's people. The Pentecost event of Acts 2 is constitutive for the church in a similar way to how the Sinai event of Exodus 19 is constitutive for ancient Israel as the people of God.

There is a theological pattern here that is uniquely emphasized in our Reformed Theology: grace precedes commandment. First, God sets us free in God's own initiative, then God leads us into right living. Grace comes first, freedom is given to us, and out of freedom we choose a life of obedience and righteousness according to God's word for us.

This Easter season we are in now is a time for claiming the grace of the cross and the empty grave as our own and letting that grace permeate all aspects of our life, leading us to freedom. At the same time, in 2021, we are feeling the freedom of emerging from our stay-at-home realities of this pandemic year. We are also waiting for and anticipating a transition into a new normal in our personal lives and in our shared life as a church.

This year, may we claim the gift and good news of grace we find at the cross and the resurrection. At the same time, may we be sensitive to how the Spirit is at work in our midst in power. May we listen and learn from Spirit guiding us into new ways of being church. Who is God calling us to be as a church now and who will God call us to be in years to come. First grace, then instruction and vocation from God. We are set free to live in freedom as the people of God. What will God teach us from Easter and Pentecost this year as a church?

### Kisauni Update

In spite of the pandemic, in spite of the rainy season, the Kisauni parish is worshiping and has just restarted their in-person worship under protocols similar to ours. The schools are currently on a break for testing of the older grade children. It is anticipated the schools will reconvene within the next couple of weeks. In the meantime, vaccinations are progressing. Beatrice

mentions that she has had her first vaccination (or jab as they call it) and teachers are currently receiving their vaccinations.

In January we sent funds to Kisauni for the feeding and hygiene programs. Both programs have had disruptions this year with the pandemic, so the funds have been held for the restart of school. In addition, we provided some funds for use at their discretion. These discretionary funds have been used to help provide for a manse which has been a dream of the parish for some time.

The rainy season is causing flooding in much of Kenya. However, Beatrice reports that so far they have escaped the heavy rains.

As our Kisauni brothers and sisters say, 'God is Good, All the Time!"

#### **Notes From Session**



Session has met regularly during the pandemic. Sometimes more than once a month. Despite not meeting in the building, the business of the congregation has continued. We have several things we can feel pleased about. We have continued to worship together, live streamed, and have even gained new attendees as a result. We have learned to have virtual communion meals together. Many of us have learned the technology of group meetings, which has allowed several groups

to meet regularly and share and grow together. We have done well financially, as the generosity of our membership has not flagged, and our Finance Team has invested our savings wisely. CPC received some large bequests, that Session has invested, and has plans on using to the betterment of our community.

We have just entered our Season of Eastertide, and Session and Deacons have plans to continue in their work to seek God's will and fulfill our mission. The Mission team plans a clean up of the dry canyon on May 22, 2021. Last year's clean up went very well. The deacons plan on hosting a Neighborhood Carnival (COVID permitting) the Saturday prior to Vacation Bible School, probably the last week of July. We hope to invite all of our church family, as well as folks from the community.

Our congregation also faces a few challenges in the months to come, and we all need to consider how we can use our collective talents in helping out. Tammy Whitehead has taken a full time position closer to her home. This leaves a large gap in our office, and the Staff would welcome those who have the abilities to volunteer and fill in as we search for a replacement. Session is entering into ongoing conversations about the present and future of ministries to youth, children, and families, with a focus on outreach to our Redmond community. Kelsey recommends that regular, faithful volunteers will go a long way in building the youth program. Diane is faithfully leading ministries to children and planning a summer outreach program, and ongoing volunteer support will be needed

The Nominating Team will soon begin on their 2021 process, including possibly a mid-year nomination for a new elder to lead in the area of finance. The Property Team has helped place a lighted sign at our entrance, as well as maintained the property and kept our building looking nice. They also oversaw the improvement in the heating and cooling of our lower level. We will all appreciate that.

Pastor Andrew looks forward to baptizing Andrew and Maddox Barr on May 16, 2021. As a congregation we all have a responsibility in helping these youngsters in their spiritual growth.

Session plans on using Pentecost Sunday, May 23, 2021 as a venue to discuss a Vision for our congregation as we continue to seek how best to meet God's Mission for us in ministering not only to our congregants, but to our neighbors, our community, our nation and the world.
